

Appeal to raise £237,000 for Seraph's cancer treatment in New York

Seraph is extremely cheeky and likes dinosaurs, Lego, Minecraft, and giggling like an idiot.

Seraph also has high-risk neuroblastoma - an aggressive childhood cancer, with only a 40% chance of surviving the next five years.

His family hope he will show no evidence of the disease at his scans in May, yet almost 50% of children will relapse and their survival chance then drops dramatically to less than 1 in 10.

Seraph's parents are appealing for your help to fundraise for treatment in New York that's showing promise in reducing the chances of his cancer coming back, giving him the best chance of living cancer-free.

Funds raised will go towards helping Seraph and his family. If Seraph no longer needs the funds or is in remission 5 years post the end of successful treatment, the funds will be used to support other children and families affected by neuroblastoma through our activities. The fundraising target identified above combines the cost of treatment, the associated costs (e.g. travel and accommodation) as well as contingency for any unforeseen complications.



For children with high-risk neuroblastoma, like Seraph, the survival rate is much lower than other childhood cancers. Upon relapse, this rate reduces even further to less than one in ten. Seraph is nearing the end of immunotherapy treatment and everyone hopes he will be in remission when he has his end of treatment scans in May 2019.
